## DOGS OF SELBY

Dogs are social pack animals by nature. They are also territorial and protective. Dogs are also animals and no matter how much humans believe they know how their canines will react to certain people or situations, we are still left stupefied when they do the unthinkable. Dogs have keen hearing and a keen sense of smell and can detect feelings that humans simply can not. Aside from aggression issues, many larger breeds are highly excitable and can knock down small children. With that being said, allowing your dog to roam and act upon these superhuman senses is illegal in Maryland and can be very dangerous for the public especially small children. The leash law in Maryland states that a dog must be on a leash AND in control when off the property of it's owner. Neutering or spaying dogs can help decrease their urge to escape and roam as well. Selbians are strongly encouraged to check their gates and fences for ways that these escape artists can get out and roam freely. Free roaming dogs also create a safety hazard for themselves if they step out in front of cars or chase cars.

The best part about dogs is that they like to play and have fun. Selby is a dog friendly community, but

there are simple rules that must be followed in order not to impede upon the rights of others. No dogs are allowed on the beach or on the playground area. Dogs are welcome on either side of the beach where there is plenty of room to play and enjoy the water.



Simple adherence to these rules will keep the beach a pleasant place for all residents to visit.

## CICADAS? HELLO?



Earlier this year the big news was CICADAS! The term "swarmagedon" was used to describe the craziness that was supposed to descend upon us mere humans. The months passed with nothing that even remotely

resembled a swarm of anything. So what happened? Did good ol' Brood II fail us? Yes and no. There are several factors and theories to explain why our local area dodged the crazy bug bullet. The spring had some wacky weather with the temperatures going up and down. The ground has to reach 64 degrees before the bugs are encouraged to dig out. Urban development is also responsible. When there is a lot of construction in an area, then eggs can get destroyed and wipe out a good percentage of the chirping

cicadas. Sometimes a single brood can just have a spotty disbursement. By mid-June, some affected areas in Maryland saw their cicada population come and go. It looks like our immediate area is due for a 17-year cicada showing in 2021 and the maps show the possibilities are very good. Until then, don't throw out those recipes! Late summer usually hosts a few local cicadas to enjoy!

## JELLYFISH! SWIM BUDDIES! NOT!

You know it's summer when you start to see the sea nettles floating by on top of the water. Sea nettles, jellyfish, jellies...whatever you call them, are quite a mystery. Besides stinging, no one is really quite sure what else these creatures do. Not much. The mystery is solved!

Sea nettles can be found from Cape Cod all the way down the east coast into the Caribbean and the Gulf of Mexico. The Chesapeake Bay has the most abundant population though. We are the sea nettle capital! White jellies populate the middle tributaries of the Chesapeake while the southern Bay is home to a more red or maroon jellyfish. The sea nettles do not have many natural predators. Sea turtles rarely come up into the Bay and some fish species like the butterfish and harvestfish prefer a higher salinity. They are also very prolific. A jellyfish with a 4" diameter can release 40,000 eggs daily! The eggs attach themselves to hard surfaces like oyster shells where they grow into polyps. The polyps are dormant through winter then bud off into little sea nettles in May through August. They can start to reproduce when they reach a 1 1/2" diameter. Sea nettles are mostly water and salt with very little organic material. Just a bit of food results in major growth and the bigger the jelly the more they eat. Sea nettles eat microscopic crustaceans called copepods as well as young minnows, bay anchovy eggs, worms, mosquito larvae and comb jellies. The long tentacles of the jellyfish are used to sting it's prey and to carry it up into the heart-shaped gastric

pouches in the swimming bell. They swim and eat continuously without interruption since the tentacles act independent of each other. The tentacles can also sting people and although it's relatively harmless, it sure can hurt especially small children. Lightweight clothing can protect against a jellyfish's sting as well



as a layer of petroleum jelly on exposed skin. Common remedies used to relieve pain associated with jellyfish stings are meat tenderizer or baking soda. Jellyfish don't play a vital role in the Bay, but they do play a part. They eat comb jellyfish which are a threat to oyster larvae. Selby Beach swim area is equipped with nets to keep jellies out. Although some do get in, the majority are stopped. As always, use caution when swimming.

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## UPDATE ON GBA

In the Spring edition of The Bay Winds, there was an article about neighborhood gangs and the GBA graffiti throughout Selby. The community got together with the Anne Arundel County police department to discuss our concerns and answer any questions that may come up. The police confirmed that the GBA was not a violent gang and seems to be more graffiti based than anything. Counties close to us, like Prince Georges, have not heard of GBA so this may be quite localized. The GBA does have a Facebook account where pictures of graffiti are displayed along with a few personal pictures of people concealing their identities. The police are learning all that they can and monitoring the activity closely. In the meantime, they are working with communities in an attempt to clean up the graffiti that annoyingly seems to pop up everywhere.

## IS SELBY BAY SWIMMABLE? IS THE SOUTH RIVER SWIMMABLE?

Why did the teacher jump in the river? What kind of fish can't swim? Answers are at the end.

This time of year I always receive the same question from South River residents, "is the river safe to swim in, is Selby safe to swim in?" My answer to this question is that depending upon when, where, and how are you recreating in the South River, some places are safe, some are not, and after a rain it is never safe. *Did you know* that after what is considered to be a rain event (1 inch of rain or more) Anne Arundel County's beaches are under a no swimming and no direct water contact advisory for 48 hours due to predicted elevated bacteria levels from rainwater runoff? Why? Because after it rains everything flows downhill into our great South River and Selby Bay carrying with it all of the fecal waste from leaky sewers, septic, pets, geese, and other sources. Amazingly, it's not uncommon, shortly after a rainfall, for people to be swimming in the stormwater which contains the fecal waste (bacteria), viruses, and chemicals. Residents are literally swimming in "poo water." This is absolutely not safe for anyone, and most residents do not know that there is a no swim advisory or that the bacteria levels actually get high enough for concern.

This last rain event where we had close to 4 inches of rain, and the pumping stations were overflowing, the pet waste and goose waste was all going down into Selby Bay- this is what causes the high bacteria counts in our river, and can cause potential infections to human health if swimming. These are issues that are easily fixed, with stormwater remediation, picking up pet waste, not feeding the duck or geese (they keep coming back if you feed them).

Many species of bacteria and viruses occur naturally in the environment. However, due to stormwater runoff, leaky septic systems, failing sewer pipes and (occasionally) pump stations, boat discharge, and animal and pet waste; the bacteria concentrations now increase greatly after rains. This impacts our ability to recreate/swim in the water because high concentrations of bacteria can potentially lead to dangerous infections for us, our children, or our pets that can include urinary tract infections, bacteremia, gastroenteritis, dehydration, diarrhea, skin irritation, and in extreme cases, death.

There are other things that make the waters dangerous to swim in during certain times of the year.

*Vibrio vulnificus* is a species of bacteria that naturally occurs in waterways such as the South River. When the water warms during the summer (above 80°F), this bacteria multiplies quickly. People can get vibrio from being injured in the water while swimming or recreating, eating raw or under cooked shellfish or crabs, cross contamination of shellfish with other foods, or exposing sores or cuts to the water. Symptoms include infection, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea and/or stomach pain- these symptoms can last from 12-72 hours. Cuts and sores may have swelling, redness, pain, or blistering at the site of the cut/sore. If you see any of these signs after contact with the water, go to a doctor right away, tell them you swam or recreated in the river.

Other things that could be of potential risk is what is known as Harmful Algae Blooms (HAB). Residents may have noticed that the South River turns a reddish-brown color, otherwise known as a Mahogany Tide. The Mahogany Tide is comprised of *Prorocentrum minimum*, a dinoflagellate with golden brown chloroplasts - or in general terms, a microscopic reddish-brown plant with a tail. This microscopic plant can produce a venerupin (hepatotoxin) toxin which could result in gastrointestinal illness or death in humans. To date, this toxin has not been a cause of documented death or illness in the Chesapeake Bay region, however it is still advised not to swim or recreate during a Mahogany tide bloom.

My family and I love recreating and swimming in Selby Bay, South River and the Chesapeake Bay, but I take careful precautions, I watch the bacteria results and algae blooms, and do not swim for 48 hours after a rain events. So in general the answer to the question - Is Selby Bay is safe to swim in? the answer is YES, just not directly after a the rain event or during an algae bloom.

## I SCREAM FOR SUNSCREEN!

Sunburn. We've all experienced the sun's painful bite. Either we don't put enough sunscreen on or we don't use it at all. 88% of a person's lifetime sun exposure happens before the age of 18. Those burns we endured as a rite of passage as children may come back to haunt us later in life. It's never too late though and it's definitely a good habit to impress upon the younger crew.

SPF stands for Sun Protection Factor and it determines the amount of protection the sunscreen offers. SPF can be as high as 100, but over 50 won't make too much of a difference. When looking at different sunscreens, look for "broad spectrum" which protects against UVA and UVB rays. Avoid sunscreens that contain vitamin A, retinol or derivatives of retinol, retinyl palmitate and retinyl acetate, which can accelerate sun sensitivity. The Environmental Working Group recommends avoiding oxybenzone as well saying that it may disrupt hormones. They suggest using products that contain zinc oxide and titanium dioxide. Don't pay attention to those endorsements either. The Skin Cancer Foundation gives it's "seal of recommendation" to manufacturers who donate \$10,000.

Sunscreen requires a little forethought. It's best to apply the lotion 15 to 30 minutes before going outside. A good habit is to put it on before you get dressed. This allows time for the lotion to get absorbed into the skin. Repeat applications about every 2 hours or after swimming or sweating heavily.

There are no waterproof sunscreens. Babies younger than 6 months should not use sunscreen. They should be shielded from the sun altogether. Don't be afraid to lather it on. A golfball size glob will do. Opt out of the spray option. Sprays don't provide enough sunscreen to the skin to actually be effective and the fumes can be harmful if inhaled. Keep an eye on the expiration date and toss if it's over. Sunscreen loses it's effectiveness in time. If the sunscreen doesn't have a date stamped on it, then write the purchase date on the bottle with a marker and toss after two years.

## BOAT SAFETY

Ah boating season! This is the time of year everyone plops their vessels into the Bay waters and head out to Harness Creek or the Rhode River to raft up and swim and spend the day in the sun. Who wants to think that anything bad could possibly happen on these perfect summer days? Unfortunately they do...often. Many times it is due to ignorance of boating rules and the ways of the water. The Maryland DNR sponsors a boaters' safety course that is easy, informative and can save your life. The MD Boaters' Safety Course is required for those whose birthdays fall on or after 1 July 1972, but it is highly encouraged that everyone who is out on the water, whether they drive or not, take this course. The Boaters' Safety Course goes over buoy meanings and how to enter and leave rivers, who has the right-of-way when two boats are coming straight for each other and rules and regulations regarding what is required to be on a boat at all times. Just recently, there was an unfortunate incident involving a fueling boat. The Boaters' Safety Course instructs boaters to clear a boat when fueling and run the blower after

fueling to get rid of lingering fumes that can ignite. There is a lot to boating than jumping in and turning a key and the Boaters' Safety Course will shed light on a lot of it and make the water safer for everybody. The course is now an online course and is very easy to navigate through. It doesn't have to be taken all at one time, but can be broken up into days. The course is free and the certificate is \$29.50 after the final exam is taken and passed. It is good for a lifetime and replacement cards are free and easy to acquire. There's really no good reason not to take this course if you operate a boat on Maryland waters. Also, for you jet ski operators, remember that NO ONE is allowed to operate a jet ski under the age of 16 with or without a boaters' safety course certificate.

SUMMERTIME TICKS

We've had our fair share of rain this summer and the grass is growing long. Long grass is a haven for ticks and your chances of finding at least one tick this year is fairly good. Ticks are tiny arachnids that don't fly, jump or blow in the wind. They move along slowly as opposed to spiders that are quick and nimble. They are a parasite that lives off the blood of a host. Many ticks limit themselves to certain hosts while a few are nonselective. Those nonselective ticks are the greatest threats to humans. Ticks have amazing sensory organs that can detect trace amounts of gases such carbon dioxide which is given off by animals and humans. They can sense this from quite a large distance and pinpoint an area that has high traffic. Once the area is detected, they climb up on an object, such as a blade of grass, and wait for their host. A simple brush is all that's needed to pick up the waiting tick and send it on it's way looking for an out-of-the-way area such as a knee pit to settle down and feed. Ticks' saliva contains an analgesic so their bite is painless. Some ticks can carry diseases that can be passed from tick to host. Ticks are not born with diseases, but pick them up from other hosts which makes nonselective ticks more likely to be carriers. The longer the tick feeds, then the greater the risk. The most common disease spread by ticks is Lyme Disease which can set in at approximately 24 hours from the time of the bite.

A set of fine point tweezers are best to use in the removal of a tick. Grasp the tick at the closest point to the skin and apply a firm, steady pressure. Don't jerk. The goal is to remove the tick in it's entirety. Once the tick is removed, you should see a small piece of "skin". This is actually the cement the tick




uses to attach itself to the host while it feeds. Wash the area well with soap and water. If you are suspect that the tick may carry a disease, then wrap the tick in a damp, not soaking, paper towel and seal in a baggie in the refrigerator. The damp paper towel will keep the tick from dehydration making identification easier. Watch the area for any signs of irritation most commonly, in the case of Lyme Disease, a bullseye rash at the site of the bite.
